Guidance: Emergency Telehealth Rule Changes

As of March 9, Ohio Medicaid health care providers can use telemedicine in place of in-person visits. These rules will relax regulations so that more people can be served safely in their homes.

This is a regulatory change being offered by the Ohio Department of Medicaid to help reduce the risk of exposure to coronavirus (COVID-19) for patients, their families, and the health care workforce. In addition to increasing access to care, these rules also seek to reduce pressure on Ohio hospitals.

Providers must document their use of telemedicine and meet minimum standards of care.

People should ask if their health care providers are offering the newly authorized services. All Medicaid changes apply to Medicaid fee-for-service (FFS), Managed Care Plan (MCP), and MyCare Ohio Plan (MCOP) services.
