- Everything was moved from the 4Oaks building to Toward Independence on January 4th. We have the use of the entire basement area, along with part of a storage closet for our supplies.
- Students began coming to TII on Monday January 8th. The transition so far has gone well for the school districts and our staff.

Program Information:

• Benefits and Compliance Coordinator sent an email to individuals/families concerning the Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) through Social Security. SS sends this letter at the end of every year with an explanation of how an individual's benefits will be changed due to the living adjustment. In addition, I provided guidance for families. This letter is a written notification that includes the responsibilities of the rep payee (I also provided a link to the SS site for further information and clarification). I also provided guidance of the importance of the individual as a rep payee (if applicable) to be aware of what kind of SS the individual is receiving, and how SS came to the determination of what they will receive monthly. It is a rep payee and or individuals' responsibility to understand and follow all reporting standards. There have been numerous appeals due to overpayments where the rep payee did not report monthly income.

December 20th: Nerf Night: Last event held at 4-Oaks. Approximately 20 kids plus parents attended. Recreation events:



Greene County Board of Developmental Disabilities January 17th, 2024 Board Report:

Updates:

As I had mentioned on my last report, there has been an uptick in recent months in Autism referrals, children showing signs of Autism, behavioral concerns, transfers from other counties, and highly involved infants and toddlers. Due to those increased referrals, we had reached out to the Greene County Educational Service Center to aide in evaluations and support families with developmental concerns in the areas of behavior and social emotional needs. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was put in place between Public Health, GCBDD, and Greene County ESC in order to collaborate and expand our early intervention multidisciplinary team. They have started supporting us with these evaluations throughout November and December. It has been a great start to our new partnership. In addition to the ESC, an Educational Consultant with the Ohio Deaf and Blind Education Services can now also help serve as a second discipline for our vison referrals.

Noteworthy Monthly Data/Numbers:

Our Active IFSP number for November was 277 and in December it was 274. (January- 240, February- 244, March- 274, April- 278, May-272, June- 276, July- 272, and August-267, September-285).

In November, our teams completed 29 evaluations. In December, 20 evaluations were completed. Even though we experienced a small dip in evaluations for the month of December, we expect them to go back up. With the holidays, families often are not available until the new year for evaluations, and there has been a lot of illness unfortunately.

Greene County EI received 22 referrals in November and 23 in December. As in previous months, the highest referral sources were parents, then physicians, followed by other various sources such as hospital child find specialists, Children Services, etc.

Our Early Intervention teams served a total of <u>530</u> infants and toddlers in 2023. In 2022, we served 489.

Program Information:

With the increase in Autism referrals and behavioral concerns, we are working on connecting with OACB about a training called "Impact of COVID-19 Trauma/Toxic Stress om Early Brain Development" being offered. A short session was provided at the OACB Conference at the end of November, and we feel our staff will benefit from it greatly.

Special Events/Activities:

Our Autism Diagnostic Education Program (ADEP) Team have evaluations set up in the months of February, March, and April. Our ADEP Team includes Raleita Furlow, MSEd (DS and ADEP Coordinator), Gina Tulamarie, MA, CCC/SLP, Anne Marie Cardilino, MS, CCC/SLP, Jennifer Montague, MS (DS and PLAY Consultant), and Robin Stewart (DS and PLAY Consultant). Our medical partner is Dr. Boreman, MD, FAAP, Medical Director of the Autism Center and Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrician at Dayton Children's Hospital.

Parent/Provider/Staff Feedback:

Additionally by having virtual meetings it encouraged me to reach out more. The staff was always available via text. It's a very easy gateway to encourage further communication.
- The time and attention I received from the developmental specialist, Kaitlyn Gillum. She gave us so many tips for activities and exercises to do with my son to help him meet his milestones.
- Pam PT was very kind and provided helpful tips
- I appreciated that although my child was transitioning into preschool quickly after starting services the time was well spent and great efforts were made to help my child. Her transition to preschool was easy and we had a great experience with the agency even though it was only a few months.
- They offered me ideas to help my son's development

If Four Oaks could improve one thing, I recommend:

- Nothing!!! We had an amazing experience!!
- I have no recommendations. I am completely satisfied.
- My time with the agency was less than 6 months. I was very satisfied with the services my child received and do not have any improvements

- Our specialist, Angela Y, was just wonderful. I can't say enough about how helpful she
 was. Continuously coming up with new strategies to try. She would reach out even if
 we had nothing scheduled to share new information with us for things we could try.
 She checked in with us frequently. Angela truly went above and beyond and our child
 was always happy to interact with her. She is a true joy and it is apparent just how
 much she loves this job. Our family greatly appreciates her.

GOOD NEWS: Individual (Last Board Report service highlight story) who had to be out of one placement by Christmas, 2023, was able to move to his new home BEFORE Christmas! He was even placed 2 weeks prior to Christmas to get settled in and is doing well. This is the end result of two years of efforts to find appropriate placement/provider in the midst of the DSP crisis.

 - o Shared living services and Residential Respite
- Self-Directed Transportation: determining appropriateness of this service, identifying independent travelers, and monitoring of this service

Respite House utilization: This program provides weekend respite from Friday evening to Sunday afternoon at our respite house in Xenia. Current service provider is Right at Home. Fifty-six (56) respite stays occurred during 2023. Analysis of usage indicates that those stays involved seventeen (17) individuals who stayed anywhere from one to ten times. Goal for 2024 is to expand the number of individuals using this respite resource.

Equal People Sunday afternoon respite: Pilot program launched in October 2023 and focuses on one of our underserved populations, individuals with intensive behavioral support needs. Respites occur twice monthly; staffing and activities are tailored to meet the needs of the

individuals that attend. Four individuals used this service in November and December. SSAs are working with families/individuals to fill the January and February respite slots.

New "News":

Self- Directed Transportation update: Beginning January 1, 2024, we have a local funded option for self-directed transportation. Individuals 18 and up, who are not on waivers, can access local funds of \$200 per month for community- based transportation. Individuals must have an assessed need for transportation in the community, be independent travelers, be candidates for self-directed services, and also be able to use Uber/Lyft.

Our Southwestern Ohio Council of Government (SWOCOG) provided the following information regarding Respite for Resilience, which provided respite services for children with intensive behavior needs:

Announcement of Service Change

Club Phoenix, the Respite Home opened in partnership with Envision, will cease to operate on January 1, 2024. We want to thank Envision for their partnership in pioneering the Respite for Resilience program model with SWOCOG and five of our local County Boards of Developmental Disabilities: Butler, Clermont, Greene, Hamilton, and Warren. We also thank all of the many entities who worked together to help support the success of the 24 youth and their families served in the last 2 years.

This is not the end of Respite for Resilience! We are excited to take all that we have learned and build new relationships with future partners rooted in trauma-responsive care. We will be releasing Requests for Proposals in January 2024, where providers can learn more about the parameters and expectations for utilizing this program model. We will review submitted proposals, select providers, onboard and train, and launch sometime in 2024. It will be a busy year— stay posted for details as they unfold!

In the meantime, please know that our Multisystem Coordination program includes access to other specialized services, including Family Resilience Workers, Therapists, and Trainers. Our goal is to continue supporting families with these services while we wait for our new respite homes to open.
