Updates: SSA Case Assignments

The month of April was dedicated to managing caseloads and recruiting a new SSA Manager. At present, there are two case loads who do not have an SSA: one resulting from an employee's departure and the other due to a leave of absence. Consequently, we have had to address a total of 50 cases that required coverage. The cases have been temporarily redistributed among the remaining members of the SSA team. The SSA division has been diligently working to ensure continuity of services for all individuals in the absence of a permanent SSA.

In addition to increasing the number of cases on our caseloads, we have encountered several noteworthy cases related to eligibility and crisis situations. One such case involved an individual whose parent passed away, leaving them alone in the home. Although this individual is capable of being alone for extended periods, the parent predominately handled daily living activities, including grocery shopping and financial management. The situation escalated when family discovered that the water supply to the home had been disconnected. Furthermore, extended family members suspect that mortgage payments have not been made, requiring immediate attention to find housing. There is also little knowledge regarding the individual's financial status and eligibility for things such as Medicaid and Social Security.

Another situation arose involving an individual from one of the Intermediate Care Facilities (ICFs) who required urgent assistance. The Greene County Board of Developmental Disabilities (GCBDD) was informed by the ICF about a resident who has been misled into believing they are in a relationship with a so-called 'famous person.' This individual expressed a desire to leave the ICF, asserting their 'right' to chase this dream. While the ICF is trying to address the situation with the individual, the individual has declared a preference for homelessness over remaining in the facility as they prepare to relocate to this new destination, where they intend to marry a well-known sports figure. The individual is convinced that the ICF is withholding funds that could be directed to this 'famous person.' Subsequently, the state was notified, and discussions were held with the individual, who now requests an exit waiver to reside in Greene County. The GCBDD will provide support to ensure the individual's safety while navigating their determination to move out of state to be with this celebrity.

Both cases mentioned above were assigned to SSAs who were already at or above capacity. SSAs have to devote significant attention to start address these emergent situations while continuing to manage daily documentation, monitoring, urgent situations, phone calls, and other responsibilities related to their current clients, families/guardians, and service providers.

Program Information: Adaptive Equipment and Accessibility Modifications

GCBDD SSAs work with SWOCOG throughout the year to help individuals get specialized equipment through their insurance card and/or Medicaid waivers. Twenty items have been delivered and closed out, while 9 are still open and in process. Referrals for Environmental modification for accessibility needs for 2024 totaled 22, with 16 projects completed and 6 still underway and in process. Modifications include but are not limited to ceiling transfer lifts, wheelchair ramps, accessible shower installations. Adaptive equipment can include grab bars, bath lifts, electric transfer lifts and sensory equipment.

Noteworthy Monthly Data/Numbers:

Our Active IFSP number for April 2025 was 239, and our teams completed 36 evaluations. Our teams continue to complete high numbers of evaluations and visits throughout each month.

Greene County El received 39 new referrals in March. The highest referral sources were parents, then physicians, followed by other various sources such as hospital child find specialists, Children Services, etc.

Program Information:

Our Autism Diagnostic Education Program (ADEP) Team has evaluations scheduled for May, June, and July. Our ADEP Team includes Raleita Furlow, MSEd (DS and ADEP Coordinator), Gina Tulamarie, MA, CCC/SLP, Anne Marie Cardilino, MS, CCC/SLP, Jennifer Montague, MS (DS and PLAY Consultant), and Robin Stewart (DS and PLAY Consultant). Our medical partner is Dr. Boreman, MD, FAAP, Medical Director of the Autism Center and Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrician at Dayton Children's Hospital.

P.L.A.Y. Project (Play and Language for Autistic Youngsters Project) – parent implemented, intensive early intervention program for young children with autism that is evidence-based.

Our P.L.A.Y. Team includes Jennifer Montague (PLAY Coordinator, DS, and PLAY Consultant), Beth Brennaman (DS and PLAY Consultant), and Tina Snyder (OT and PLAY Consultant).

***The team is currently serving 9 families whose children in the program are all between the ages of

3 - 5.

Special Events/Activities:

Greene County Board of Developmental Disabilities are continuing to partner with Greene County Parks & Trails for monthly events in 2025. Early Intervention's events called "Toad-ally Together" are scheduled for June 27th and August 8th this year. These events are meant to bring kids and families of all abilities *together*. • I love how personable the therapists were. The flexibility was also great! Since I have a medically complex kiddo, I really appreciated everyone's diligence in being healthy when attending an in person visit.

If Four Oaks could improve one thing, I recommend:

- I wish we could have spent more time working with them.
- Having a note system that parents can access to be reminded of their recommendations.
- The only "issue" we had was losing Pam (PT) partway through my son's time. We missed the PT during the transition, however it worked out fine in our case.

93% of families receiving early intervention services for their child report that the services are either good or excellent, according to a study published by the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Intervention BEFORE kindergarten is crucial!

Studies have shown that children who receive early intervention for developmental delays are more likely to:

- Graduate from high school
- Hold jobs
- Live independently
- · Avoid teen pregnancy, delinquency, and violent crime

Identifying and addressing social-emotional problems early reduces the need for special education.

All infants and young children should be screened as part of their ongoing health care to ensure they are meeting developmental milestones. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends screening using standardized, validated tools like the Ages & Stages Questionnaire.


Transition:

- Transition team is wrapping up all their work with the schools for the 24/25 school year. Kathy is still attending IEPs through mid-June.
- The Healthy Relationship Team is working on scheduling dates with Towards Independence for classes for their individuals served, as well as training for their staff. The team will also be looking at scheduling classes and meetings for interested parents this summer, and individual meetings of interest for individuals that we serve.
- The team is working cooperatively with All Hands In and Josh C. to put together a Provider and Agency Fair. We will spend this summer

- preparing/organizing for this to take place in the fall at a location to be determined.
- The team continues to work on coordinating Summer
 Programming/Camp with parents, individuals and providers to include
 making sure all paperwork is complete and provided to the individuals
 selected provider and maintaining communication with providers
 regarding funding, transportation questions etc. for both Transition
 Summer Programming and Summer Camp.
- Beavercreek High School and the Greene County Career Center have finished working at the Hampton Inn for the 24/25 school year. The hotel will let us partner with them again next year to provide work skills training for our transition age youth.
- Yellow Springs High School transition students have also finished their 24/25 school year at Tom's Market.
- We are looking forward to the 25/26 school year and working with our partners to open up new opportunities and hopefully some new locations for our transition students to have more areas of interest to choose from.

"Once such request came In April, when I was contacted by an Individuals SSA regarding a need for clothing, and kitchen / dining supplies. This individual had to discard most of these items and did not have the funds to replace them. I was able to

find an organization that was able to assist with replacing the kitchen / dining supplies. I am currently working with this individual's SSA to secure additional clothing and other needs."

- Continuing to explore / expand the network of community resources to aid families / individuals who need additional resources and supports. Josh has reached out to various agencies and has been able to set up visits and been able to learn more about what they are able to provide. Josh also been attending Greene County Linkage Meetings to continue to learn more about what resources are available around the area.
- Will continue to work on updating the GCBDD Website Family and Individual Support Tab to include resources / support information for individuals / families to access.
- Attended 1st Voices of Greene County Monthly Meeting in April to introduce himself to the group, as Josh will be working with the group as part of self-advocacy.
- Working on a project called Love in Action. This will be acts of service that will be open opportunities to serve. We will be Starting in June and will be partnering with various local organizations to accomplish this. We are looking to do this once a month to start. In June we will be serving at Bridges of Hope in Xenia where we will be helping to do various tasks around the center and perhaps help serve a meal. We are still working on putting together the schedule for the rest of 2025. We are looking forward to partnering with these different agencies to accomplish this.
