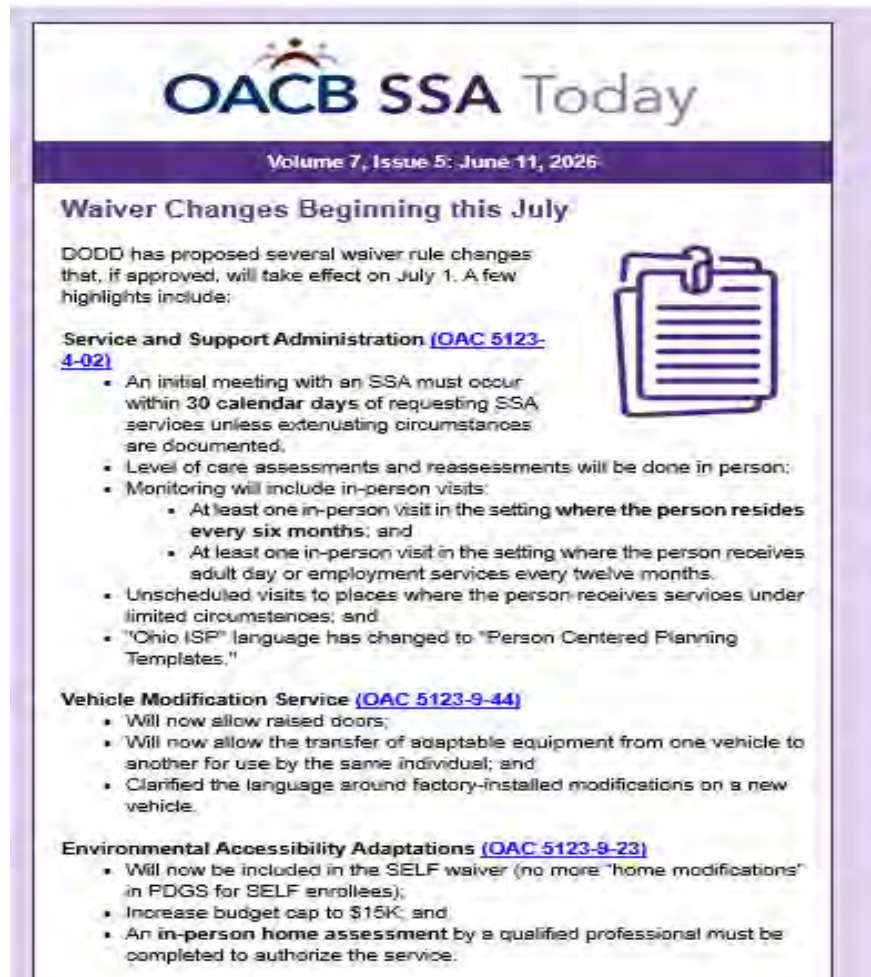

RULE UPDATES:

DODD revised several administrative rules with effective dates of July 1, 2026. Below is an excerpt from SSA Today providing a brief highlight of some of the changes along with the actual Ohio Administrative Code rule references.



The Service and Support administration rule contains several changes with one notable one pertaining to monitoring requirements.

We recently talked about the updated regulations concerning the responsibilities of the SSAs. To keep the community well-informed, we have published this on the GCBDD website:



BIG NEWS!

You'll be seeing your SSA in person more often!

Under OAC 5123-4-20, your Service and Support Administrator (SSA) will complete more **required in-person visits**, including:

- 🏠 Home visits at least every **6 months**
 - If you have Medicaid services/enrolled on a waiver, SSAs are required to complete in home visits
 - Even if you have no services happening in your home, SSAs will be scheduled to see you in your home every 6 months
- 📅 Annual OISP meetings & Level of Care assessments completed **in person**
- 👤 Annual visits to adult day or employment settings (when applicable)
- 🕒 Unscheduled visits as needed

If you have questions, please contact your SSA. Thank you for partnering with us to support you and/or your loved one!

The SSAs are initiating increased monitoring efforts at the residences of individuals, and we are starting to hear from some families who are displeased with this new requirement. The SSAs will maintain a schedule of home monitoring every six months for individuals and families who are presently receiving services. SSAs will provide a written summary of their visit to the individual/guardian following the visit.

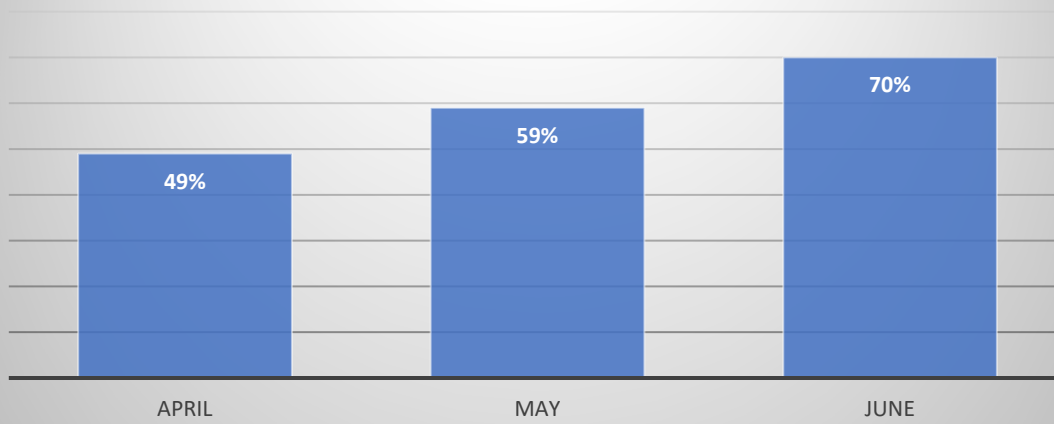

Program Information:

TCM/CASE NOTING:

Due to recent changes to TCM regarding the documentation practices of SSAs, we have been closely monitoring the productivity percentages of the SSAs. We initiated modifications to our documentation process in April. During this time, we began recording the time spent on documentation for each case note. We then incorporated the time spent on transportation to and from various meetings, monitoring sessions, and other related activities. Finally, we included the tracking of administrative time for tasks such as SSA Weekly meetings, emails that do not pertain to a specific individual, and similar activities. This outlines the response of the SSA team to the updated documentation standards:

PRODUCTIVITY %



We have recently set the productivity expectation to 75%. SSA Managers and SSAs will continue to monitor this expectation. We anticipate that both productivity and the documentation of activities will improve as we become accustomed to this process.

BEHAVIOR SUPPORTS UPDATES:

At present, the Behavior Support Specialist, Heidi Reynolds, manages 11 different rights restrictions, each at various stages of development. Some of these restrictions require meetings every 90 days, while others require meetings every 30 days. One case is so complex that it necessitates weekly meetings to address behavioral concerns. Among the 11 cases, three are currently in the planning phase for assessment and the completion of behavior plans. Heidi conducts assessments, develops strategies for intervention and monitors behaviors while working towards the goal to eliminate the restrictions. She also ensures that meeting schedules comply with regulations.

In addition to closely overseeing these restrictions, she also supports individuals who don't have a restrictive plan but nonetheless exhibit notable behaviors. Heidi often engages in discussions/planning meetings with the SSAs about possible restrictions, individuals encountering difficulties at home, and concerns related to day programming, among other subjects. This number varies each month; however, the extra cases that Heidi typically handles are usually in the range of 30 to 40 additional individual teams she could be collaborating with.

Recently, due to the increased referral for behavioral supports, the GCBDD has utilized Dynamic Pathways (DPI) services to complete some of the initial behavior assessments. While DPI does complete the assessments, Heidi and the SSA are responsible for implementation of strategies, completing all monitoring, maintaining timelines for meetings, etc.

The Behavior Team also has a specific caseload of children who do not possess a waiver but are regularly engaged with Ohio Rise. This caseload primarily consists of children with intense needs, along with others who currently are not enrolled in waivers. The SSA collaborates with families to refer them to community support services.

At present, we have two children living out of home in specialized facilities (one in Ohio and one in another state) designed for high needs. Additionally, numerous children are often hospitalized due to the extreme behaviors they exhibit. We currently have six individuals in DC placements and/or group home foster placements who require specialized housing and services due to their intense behavioral needs. One of these individuals is set to transition out of specialized housing in August, with specialized supports created in Greene County.

The Behavior Support Team is phenomenal and works very hard to assist these kids and adults toward achieving a good life.

Special Events/Activities:

New "News":

COMING SOON: The SSA Division is in the process of updating our areas on the website, particularly the section dedicated to referrals for eligibility. The Eligibility Specialists are working to make it significantly easier for individuals to submit referrals for eligibility via the website. Once operational, the website will feature a button that directs users seeking eligibility directly to the application page. Community members will have the ability to complete and submit the application directly through the website. Additionally, a QR code will be provided for SSA's, Transition Coordinators, School staff, and others to distribute to parents, facilitating convenient access to the eligibility sign-up. These applications will be sent to the Eligibility Specialists for processing and for reaching out to the referral source.

INDIVIDUAL SERVICE PLANS:

DODD has updated the OISP into two distinct "templates". They are now referred to as the "Assessment Template" and the "Planning Template". We have been informed that these templates will be accessible to the SSAs on our system in early October. We expect that the existing information from the current plan will be transferred to the new templates. Additionally, there will be some new questions included in the templates.

RESPIRE PROGRAM CHANGE: The SSA managers and SSA director met with provider Right at Home to discuss slight expansion of the respite program. Eligible individuals can continue to receive 1 respite per month (pending availability of the home). In addition to weekends (Friday afternoon to Sunday afternoon), respite stays are now available during the week (Tuesday late afternoon to Thursday late afternoon).

Items Requiring Board Approval:

SSA policy for monitoring services for individuals receiving Home and Community based waiver services. This policy is based on Ohio Administrative Code 5123-4-02 Service and Support Administration. This specific policy outlines responsibilities found in 5123-4-02 (N) Monitoring implementation of individual service plans.

GREENE COUNTY BOARD OF DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

POLICY: Monitoring for Individuals Enrolled in Home and Community-Based Services Waivers

I. Purpose

To establish consistent policy and procedures for Service and Support Administrators (SSAs) to monitor the health, welfare, safety, and satisfaction of individuals enrolled in Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid waivers in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 5123-4 and applicable Department of Developmental Disabilities (DODD) requirements.

II. Applicability

This policy applies to all Greene County Board of Developmental Disabilities SSAs assigned to individuals receiving HCBS waiver services administered through the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities.

III. Requirements for Monitoring Implementation of Individual Service Plans

A. Monitoring Schedule

1. The assigned SSA shall conduct ongoing monitoring of the implementation of the Individual Service Plan (ISP).
 2. The scope, type, and frequency of monitoring will be specified in the Individual Service Plan (ISP). Monitoring includes, but is not limited to, in person visits, contact via telephone, email or other appropriate means.
 3. Each individual enrolled in an HCBS waiver shall receive **at least one (1) face-to-face monitoring visit in the individual's residence every six (6) months**, resulting in a minimum of two (2) in-home monitoring visits during each twelve-month period.
 4. Each individual enrolled in an HCBS waiver shall receive **at least (1) in person monitoring visit to the place where the individual receives adult day or employment services every 12 months**.
-

B. Monitoring Frequency

1. Monitoring frequency may be increased in the following circumstances:
 - o Individual has intensive behavioral support or medical needs
 - o Individual experienced an interruption of services of more than 30 calendar days

- o Individual transitioned to a new provider of homemaker personal care within the past 12 months
- o Individual moved from an intermediate care facility within the past 12 months
- o Significant changes occur in the individual's circumstances.
- o Provider performance concerns exist or DODD has issued intent to suspend or revoke the provider's certification
- o At the request of the individual or the individual's guardian
- o Directed by supervisory staff.

C. Unscheduled visits

Service and Support Administrators (SSAs) may monitor services through unscheduled visits to settings where an individual receives services.

Unscheduled visits to a family home where an individual receives services may occur only:

- When multiple documented attempts to contact a family have failed and the service and support administrator has documented substantiated concerns related to the health and welfare of the individual receiving services; or
- At the request of an individual or the individual's guardian.
- A service and support administrator may request entry to the home but may not enter without the consent of the family, individual, or guardian, as applicable. If consent is denied, the service and support administrator will document denial and, if health or welfare concerns persist, refer the matter to the appropriate protective authorities.

D. Required Follow-Up

1.The service and support administrator shall share results of monitoring in a timely manner with the individual, the individual's guardian, and/or the adult whom the individual has identified, as applicable, and the individual's providers, as appropriate.

2.If the monitoring process indicates areas of non-compliance with standards for providers of services funded by a home and community-based services waiver, the county board shall conduct a provider compliance review in accordance with rule [5123-2-04](#) of the Administrative Code. The SSA and/or SSA Supervisor will refer the situation to the Greene County Board of DD Provider Support and Compliance Department for additional follow-up.

Updates:

45-Day Compliance Review:

The Ohio Department of Children and Youth (DCY) has analyzed state fiscal year 2026 data related to the 45-Day timeline. Greene County EI received a 100%!

In completing this analysis, DCY staff extracted data for child records for Early Intervention referrals whose 45-Day timelines ended January 1, 2026, through March 31, 2026. If timelines were exceeded or components were missing, the reasons for delay were examined as reported in the data system or in a separate data inquiry. If an acceptable reason for noncompliance (e.g., parent/child reason, couldn't locate/reach parent, emergency-related closure) was identified, the record was considered compliant. If there was an unacceptable reason for noncompliance (e.g., staff oversight/error, system reason, etc.), the record was considered noncompliant.

This is an extra special achievement because the timelines fell over the holidays, wintery weather, and extra complicated family scenarios. Thank you to our EI staff for their attention to detail with case notes, timelines, and continued dedication to the work we do- and our families!

House Bill 939:

Ohio House Bill 939, introduced in May 2026 by Representatives Andrea White and Mike Odioso, mandates early intervention services for infants and toddlers (birth to age three) through county Boards of Developmental Disabilities. The bill shifts early intervention from a discretionary county function to a required statewide responsibility with partial state reimbursement. I will continue to provide updates as this house bill moves through the House and hopefully sent to the Governor.

Noteworthy Monthly Data/Numbers:

Our Active IFSP number for June 2026 was 231, and our teams completed 22 evaluations.

Our Active IFSP number for July 2026 was 234, an increase from June's number of 231, and our teams completed 27 evaluations.

Greene County EI received 32 new referrals in June. The highest referral sources were parents (10), then physicians (8), followed by other various sources such as hospitals, hospital child find specialists, Children Services, neighboring county Help Me Grow programs, nonprofit community providers, etc (combined 14).

Greene County EI received 17 new referrals in July. The highest referral sources this month were children services (Clark, Greene, and Montgomery Counties) (5), then parents (3), physicians (3), followed by other various sources such as hospitals, hospital child find specialists, neighboring county Help Me Grow programs, nonprofit community providers, etc (combined 6).

Program Information:

Our Autism Diagnostic Education Program (ADEP) Team has no current evaluations scheduled as our medical partner retired. The Autism clinic does plan to continue to partner with us but will need time to organize and appoint a new medical partner for us. At this time, families can still access this testing through Dayton Children's Autism Clinic. Our ADEP Team includes Raleita Furlow, MEd (DS and ADEP Coordinator), Gina Tulamarie, MA, CCC/SLP, Anne Marie Cardilino, MS, CCC/SLP, Jennifer Montague, MS (DS and PLAY Consultant), and Robin Stewart (DS and PLAY Consultant).

P.L.A.Y. Project (Play and Language for Autistic Youngsters Project) – parent implemented, intensive early intervention program for young children with autism that is evidence-based.

Our P.L.A.Y. Team includes Jennifer Montague (PLAY Coordinator, DS, and PLAY Consultant), Beth Brennaman (DS and PLAY Consultant), and Tina Snyder (OT and PLAY Consultant).

***The team is currently serving **7** families whose children are in the program. One child is 2 years old, and the rest are all between the ages of 3 – 5.

Greene County Board of Developmental Disabilities are continuing to partner with Greene County Parks & Trails for monthly events in 2026! Early Intervention's events are part of the series of collaborated events called "Toad-ally Together". These events are meant to bring kids and families of all abilities together.

Updates:

- Greene County Community Resource and Transition Expo planning is going well. Currently we have 47 Vendors signed up and 3 attendees. We are not too concerned about the pre-registration of attendees at this point because school has not started yet. Once the schools help us get the word out and we send out more information, we anticipate the attendees will increase. Our next meeting scheduled is August 25, 3:00 pm. The flyers are attached.
- Healthy Relationship Team update- We now have a new team member to our team. Sean Wakefield completed the Elevatus training this month and passed the certification exam. Sean has already been actively involved in our Healthy Relationship Club meetings. Our Club has been going strong during the summer. We have a solid 10-12 individuals coming each time. Instead of meeting at the Board Office on the 22nd, we joined All Hands In at the Fairfield Mall for Diner's Club. We are stressing the importance of getting out and meeting people, which is an important part of healthy relationship building. Our team has also been out in the community with All Hands in for Coffee Talk and we also manned the GCBDD Table (along with Stephanie Martin and Sheila Bloom) at the Greene County Community Resource Fair on June 12th

Noteworthy Monthly Data/Numbers:

- **MUI:**
 - In the Month of June, there were 137 UIRs reviewed, and 6 MUIs filed.
 - In the month of July, there were 164 UIRs reviewed, and 10 MUIs filed

- **Providers on PAWs:**

Program Information:

Our Transition Team has visited the Summer Transition Programs (Bloom, Empowered, St. Christopher, Toward Independence, Chosen Day Array, Helping Lives Tech and Stem, Orange Lotus, Good Works Farm). The goal of this visit was to ensure the providers had the information and support they needed. They were all very pleased with how the summer programming was going. The individuals seemed happy with their respective programs. We will send out a survey to parents at end of August to get their feedback.

New “News”:

Fraud Prevention Updates

Compliance Reviews– Billing Claims Review Added

- As part of ongoing efforts to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse, the Department of Developmental Disabilities (DODD) is expanding its compliance review process. This update will help ensure that service documentation matches the claims paid to providers.
- Starting August 1, 2026, during regular compliance reviews, reviewers will validate a small random selection of 15-minute Homemaker/Personal Care (HPC) claims paid during the last three months (or the most recent three months that the provider has billed). This process will eventually expand to include additional services and billing units.

- Providers are already required by the service-specific rules to maintain all service documentation in an accessible location. All service documentation for all people served over the previous three months at the review, in electronic or physical form. If a provider is unable to provide the required service documentation for a selected claim, or the documentation does not meet the requirements of the rule, the claim is subject to repayment/recovery by the department.

HB 795/SB 315

- Governor DeWine signed the legislation passed by the General Assembly regarding fraud in Ohio's Medicaid program.

Key takeaways:

- o What was removed/avoided:
 - Total ban on paid-family caregivers
 - Requirement that every Medicaid provider conduct and submit a financial audit to ODM and for ODM to publish the audits
 - EVV within all waiver services
- o Some of the key changes proposed
 - EVV
 - Require GPS for all EVV visits, except when the service is delivered by a paid family caregiver who lives in the same home as the person receiving services; additional oversight and reporting on compliance with EVV
 - Provider Enrollment/Oversight
 - ODM must conduct in-person or on-site reviews of a provider initially and every three years
 - Flags providers with shared addresses or telephone numbers
 - Requires ODM to establish a standardized onboarding process for all providers
 - Additional oversight requirements of paid family caregivers

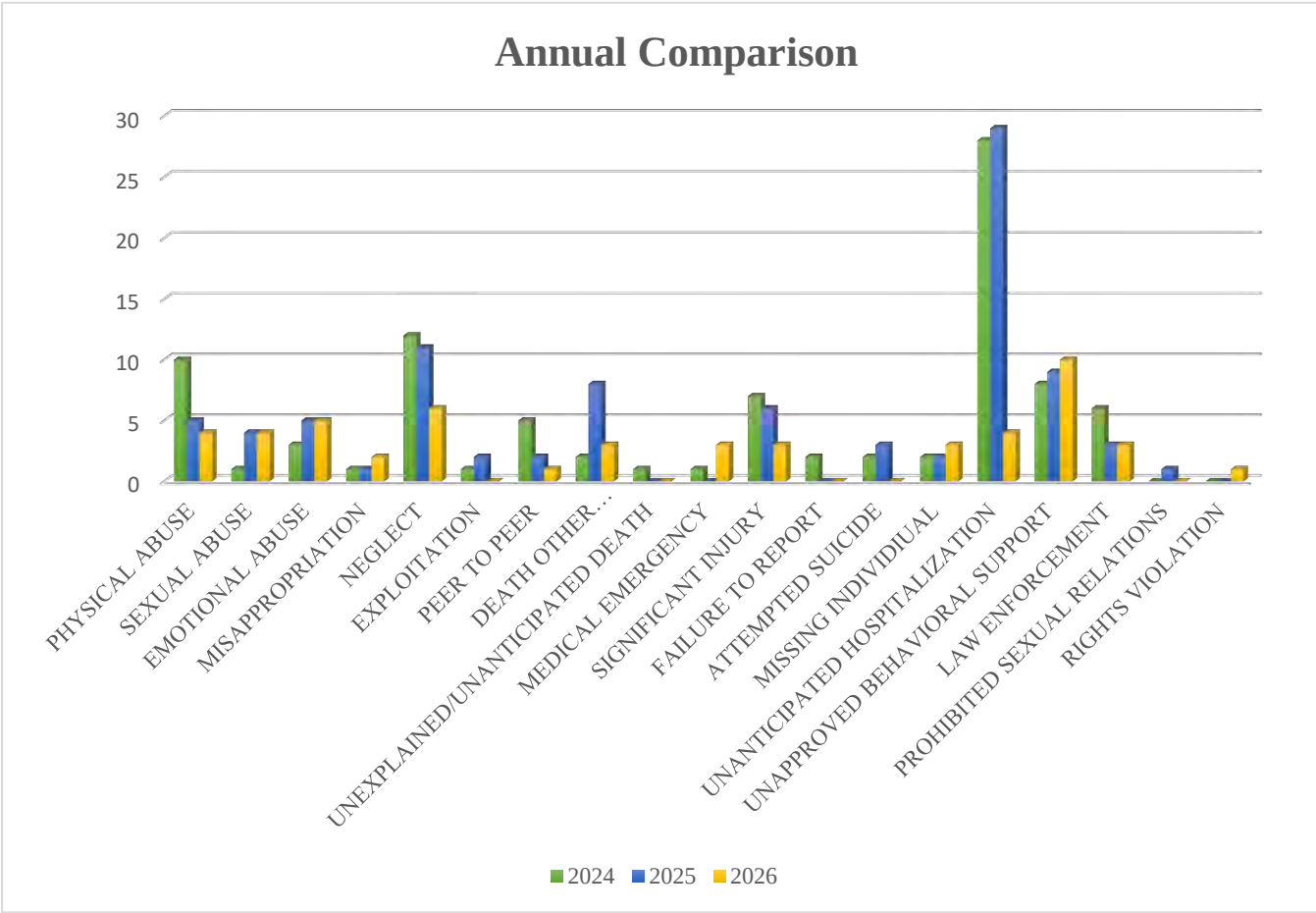
